

# **OUR STORY**

Carseland School is a beautiful, spacious school located in the hamlet of Carseland. It is in the southwest corner of the Golden Hills School Division, within the view of the Rocky Mountains and two kilometers from the Bow River. It is an elementary school with a population of 88 students from kindergarten to grade 6. Approximately 55% of the students ride one of the three school buses to and from school. One of the buses transports students from Siksika Nation, while the other two buses accommodate students from the surrounding areas. The remaining students reside within Carseland. The community preschool, Busy Bee Preschool, operates within the school building and is an important component of the school community. The preschool offers programing for children ages 3 and 4, and is an important first step in building a rapport with students in the community. A licensed Before and After School Program also operates on operational days out of the school building. This service is available to all Carseland School families.



#### 2020-2021 Results

Students continued regular programing in their cohorts and were able to participate in our powerful learning programming such as Nature Connections and Ik Ku Nutsi. Ik Ku Nutsi seen students learning the Blackfoot language and culture while connecting to the land. Within cohorts students were also able to continue entreprenurial opportunities such as Green Thumbs and even moved into examining and applying financial learning to this program. Out of the box thinking and planning allowed mentorship to occur in an outdoor setting and through virtual zoom sessions.

### 2020-2021 Results

Carseland School worked hard to maintain and nurture our partnerships within a restricted environment. The Carseland Before and After and Busy Bee Preschool continued to run out of the building and numbers increased for both programs. Carseland School increased its social media presence and distributed messages on social media platforms both through written and recorded messaging. Parent focus groups were conducted online using google forms and generated useful feedback that was applied to school planning. A new school clothing website has been developed to support a positive culture and climate and has been met with sucess. With the introduction of a greenhouse, Carseland School was able to parner with additional businesses and organizations including Nutrien and Nutrients for Life.

### 2020-2021 Results

Carseland was successful in the implementation of best-practices in areas of literacy, numeracy and technology.

Technology - All grades now offer an online platform of communication with students and families and students are able to access work online if needed.

Literacy - Carseland School classrooms applied multidimensional literacy approaches that encompass both balanced and structured literacy strategies. Staff continue to engage with research on best practices in literacy instruction.

Numeracy - Classes have worked together to develop consistency in Math approaches across the grades. More hands-on learning opportunities have been impemented in grades K-6 and plans to incorporate a school-side numeracy project utilizing the school greenhouse was planned for the 2021/2022 school year. Data has shown as improvement in numeracy scores across the grade levels.
